

The very first car show of the year is generally held at the Crosspoint Church in Colonial Park. It is held in April and organized by the Capital City Cruiser Car Club. Only two cars from our club were entered in the competition on the very cold and windy day, the 1939 Plymouth pickup of Don and Sally Roberts and the 1966 Corvair Monza of Brent Miller. Despite the weather the show was well attended with over 80 beautiful cars, trucks, and motorcycles on display. This is one show that you might want to consider in the future.



It was a beautiful day in Thompsettown on May 5 with 213 vehicles on display, the largest showing in a number of years. Fire company officials were obviously pleased with the great turnout. It was the first year in the last four that was rain free. Having a total of 30 cars on display and 38 members in attendance, the All-American Cruiser Car Club was well represented. A total of 8 trophies were won by our club.



Unfortunately the Millerstown RiverFest was cancelled and rescheduled for the following week, May 18, when other car shows were competing for vehicles. Still, a total of 127 entries were registered making it a quite successful day. This is the first year that a "Club Participation Trophy" was awarded and our club, the All-American Cruizers, won the award. So, thanks are extended to the owners of the approximately thirteen vehicles on display and 15 members in attendance. A total of ten trophies were presented to club members. It was a great day for our club.



Country Memory Days is one cruise-in that many members schedule on their calendars each year. If you like flea markets, Route 22 is lined with them as you drive from Lewistown to the show in McVeytown. Many craft and food vendors line the streets of the community. Additionally, the various forms of live entertainment amused patrons on the square. Even though trophies were not presented, very nice door prizes were awarded. Our club had a good turnout with 21 cars on display and 27 members taking in the activities.



The Central Pennsylvania Diesel Institute of Liverpool holds a small show each year to benefit the students who attend the school. A few trophies are awarded in several classes including antique/classic, truck, and newer, stock vehicles. Don and Sally Roberts attended the show on June 1, driving their Mopar 10 to the event, and speaking with various individuals about joining the All-American Cruizers Car Club.
